The program aims to provide children with an opportunity to increase their access to programs that enable them to participate in regular inclusive structured sport. It will provide children with a disability an opportunity to develop fundamental social skills, confidence and self-esteem whilst being active and healthy. The MiniRoos Kick-Off Program has a game-sense philosophy of sport participation that are player-centred, utilising interactive and fun games rather than technical drills.

The program has already been successfully delivered in Northern Beaches LGA with many of the attendees expressing an interest in a Ku-ring-gai LGA-based option. Fighting Chance designs, builds and scales social enterprises which offer long-term solutions to pressing issues facing Australians with disability and their families.

We work with our community to identify the challenges, hurdles and barriers faced by people with disability in their everyday lives, and then design and build sustainable social businesses which resolve these issues.

In our first six years of work, we have designed, built and then begun to scale two social businesses that generate a range of vocational and social participation opportunities for people with disability.

Within these businesses we run:

The Internship Program: providing vocational experience, training and skills development opportunities to school leavers and adults with significant disability who would otherwise be excluded from participation in the working world.

- The Work Experience Program: providing tailored, supported work placements to young people with disability who are so often left out of the process of transitioning from school to work.
- The School Leavers Employment Support Program: providing a tailored curriculum to prepare recent school leavers for working life and build their skills in preparation for employment.
- Open Employment: providing immediate jobs and transitional pathways into mainstream employment for people with mild and moderate disability.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

The Fighting Chance Work Experience Program - For many students with disability, the search for employment can be a time of discrimination and exclusion. Many schools report struggling to find work experience placements, which are adapted for or willing to take, students with complex support needs. In our experience, long-term unemployment begins for young adults with disability at this point, when they are actively told that work is not for them, and are not afforded access to the same work readiness opportunities the rest of us take for granted. Work experience is an important rite of passage; a few weeks spent in a working environment can provide a student with his or her first real insight into the realities of working life and perhaps, their future career.

The Fighting Chance Work Experience Program is run to benefit these school students with disability who would otherwise have very limited opportunities to gain experience in a workplace through traditional employment pathways. The Program is based in Fighting Chance's social enterprises (Avenue and Jigsaw) which both exist in order to create a range of vocational opportunities for people with disability.

**COMMENTS:** The Ku-ring-gai Division St John Ambulance NSW is seeking assistance to

purchase oxygen resuscitation and defibrillator life saving devices to accommodate the four-fold increase in demand for first aid services over the past 12 months. This increasing demand for local community first aid services has resulted in growth from a division of 7 in November 2015 to 26 in November 2016 and currently over 35 members. Since their inception in

November 2015 they have provided first aid services to 162 events.

Life saving devices are utilised by volunteer officers to assist members of the community who suffer breathing or heart problems. St Johns risk assessments have indicated a requirement for oxygen resuscitation devices and defibrillators to be made available at community events. The Ku-ringgai Division of St John Ambulance will also be making a contribution through their fundraising efforts and Council support will enable them to purchase the equipment without further delay. Most programs provided by NSW SLASA support members to integrate with Australian society though English language and skills training. However, older parents who had moved to Australia to accompany family found it difficult to learn English, make new friends and settle into a new culture. They feel significantly isolated and alone with a desire to reconnect with their language, cultural identity and community. The range of activities proposed to be run by the group include gentle exercise, craft cooking, use of computers, dancing, excursions, exhibitions and information sessions on

health, nutrition, financial advice, local services etc.

Approximately 800 Ku-ring-gai residents speak Spanish as their primary language. The project will assist some of these senior residents to become

more connected to the language and traditions of their community.

ORGANISATION BACKGROUND: Parkrun's vision is to create a healthier and happier planet by continually breaking down barriers to participation and bringing people together from all

walks of life whenever they want to come along. We believe that by 2023, we will see one million people taking part at parkrun every single weekend

across 12,000 global events.

Parkrun began with the launch of its first event in Bushy park, Teddington, UK on 2 October 2004. This event had 13 participants. parkrun launched in Australia at Main Beach on the Gold Coast in Queensland in April 2011. In the six years since the first event in Australia, the number of events,

volunteers and participants has grown exponentially.

Currently, parkrun Australia delivers 227 weekly parkrun events at locations in every state, with additional events launching in new communities almost every week. Each Saturday morning more than 32,000 participants run or walk at a local parkrun. These participants are supported by over 2,200 volunteers who deliver the events. With more than 470,000 runners, walkers and volunteers registered in Australia alone, parkrun is having significant impacts on the physical, mental and social health of the

communities we are part of.

AMOUNT REQUESTED: \$5,000

**PROJECT DESCRIPTION:** Wildflower Parkrun - The project will establish Wildflower parkrun - a free, weekly, timed 5km run/jog/walk, open to residents and visitors of St Ives,

weekly, timed 5km run/jog/walk, open to residents and visitors of St Ives, and the wider Ku-ring-gai Shire Council area. It will provide a community event every Saturday morning where participants can run, walk or

volunteer, promoting a healthy lifestyle, positive physical and mental health, and improving social cohesion and connectedness in the community.

Please note this project - Wildflower parkrun - has no project end date. This is because Wildflower parkrun has no end date and will continue for as long as the community wants and supports the event. In over 6 years since parkrun launched in Australia, no parkrun event in Australia has ever

ceased due to lack of participants or volunteers.

initiative in the Wildflower Garden. It is a weekly initiative that will continue for as long as there is community interest and participation. Their vision is to create a healthier and happier community by breaking down barriers to participation and bringing together people from all walks of life. These events are inclusive and provide an opportunity for people to improve their physical and mental health. They aim to engage people from all

backgrounds, all fitness levels and abilities, ages both as volunteers and participants. It is free to register and participate and there are no upfront or ongoing membership costs or fees. Children must be 4 years old to register but 4 year-olds can be pushed in prams or walk with a participant guardian. All Parkrun events are lead by volunteers who ensure that all events are run

according to the guidelines and rules each week. Once a Parkrun is established they are relatively self sustaining and operate with limited additional funding requirements. The nominated Wildflower Garden volunteer parkrun director is a retired honorary Professor in management

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from Macquarie University. The financial assistance sought from Council is to purchase equipment necessary to run the event e.g. stop watches, volunteer vests, flag poles and stakes, first aid kits, cones, storage containers, clip boards, lap top etc.

We successfully hosted 11 free educational workshops for the general public, community leaders and community organisations across the Ku-ringgai council region. Called – "The FACTS about Dementia", these events occurred from March to May 2017, and exposed participants to what dementia really is, how it affects individuals and their family caregivers, and educated the community about the facts of dementia, thereby increasing community awareness. The information from these sessions positively impacted the quality-of-life, social inclusion and the ability for individuals with dementia, and their family caregivers to remain active within their local community for as long as possible.

Last year's Community Grant of \$2,500 from Ku-ring-gai Council allowed 262 participants to attend these 11 sessions. Furthermore, due to demand the Rotary Club of St Ives was able to fund an additional 9 sessions throughout June 2017.

The overall outcome was 20 sessions where 400+ everyday individuals were taught what they can do to improve the quality-of-life of people-living-with-dementia. With a combination of a maximum Community Grant and our club's funding activities we aim to expose 1000+ local participants to these events during 2017/18.
