ORGANISATION NAME: 1st Gordon Scout Troop – The Scout Association of Australia, NSW Branch

ORGANISATION BACKGROUND: Scouts is an incorporated not-for-profit association/charity for children and

youth. Scouts is inclusive and welcomes all community members of diverse backgrounds and abilities. It helps young people build confidence, selfesteem, and leadership skills through outdoor recreation and educational activities while teaching the importance of honesty, integrity and community service which are essential in improving local community cohesion.

ORGANISATION BACKGROUND: StreetWork is a not-for-profit, community-based organisation that focuses

on prevention/early intervention strategies delivered to 'at risk' young people (YP) so that they have the same opportunities as their peers – that is to grow, to achieve their dreams and to develop as a person with high self-esteem. StreetWork's mission is to provide innovative and effective services for medium-high 'at risk' YP aged 11-18 affected by crime, mental health issues, violence, homelessness, social isolation, alcohol/substance misuse, those disengaged from school/education or with poor employment

with opportunities, to turn their lives around.

StreetWork has close to 40 years' experience working with 'at risk' YP, acting as a "specialist concierge" to connect YP to specific youth services providers such as Juvenile Justice, employment agencies, education and counselling services. Our aim is to assist 'at risk' YP to tackle the core problems they face, working to reinstate their self-esteem and self-worth by providing the best level of support possible. The organisation has three branches servicing Sydney's North Shore, Northern Beaches and Hornsby-Ku-ring-gai communities. StreetWork employs 9 full time, part time and

casual staff members and has more than 310 volunteers.

AMOUNT REQUESTED: \$2,000

PROJECT DESCRIPTION: StreetJam - DJ Equipment – StreetSizzle is a Mobile Outreach Hub (MOH), an early intervention strategy, whereby youth workers/trained

volunteers go to where young people gather – to meet on their "turf". The strategy is built around recurring BBQ's (via a customised BBQ trailer) in places such as local skate parks. The main objective is to provide a safe and inclusive environment for 'at risk' and/or homeless young people to receive support and connect with programs/services they may otherwise be unable to access. The program is regularly supported by other youth services organisations such as headspace and KYDS. StreetWork is now looking to expand StreetSizzle to include StreetJam, a mobile DJ unit for regular "jam-sessions", offering YP an opportunity for self-expression

through music.

This strategy is viewed favourably within the youth services sector due to the importance placed on primary development phases and the cumulative nature of risk/protective factors. By taking a holistic approach that addresses risk and protective factors, StreetWork is better positioned to alleviate disadvantage and promote general wellbeing among YP.

The key social benefits of StreetSizzle and StreetJam include:

- Provides YP with access to youth workers in order to get the support they need to address issues affecting them.
- Improves youth engagement with services/programs in the local area that can support them, including StreetWork's KickStart Mentoring Program.

Space.

Given the uniqueness of the Avenue offering, Avenue Frenchs Forest is supporting a rapidly growing cohort of 18 people with a range of severe disabilities who live in the Ku-ring-gai area. Many Team Members have specific assistive technology needs. Currently we have a few Team Members who, given their physical challenges, would greatly benefit from utilising roller ball mice and a large keyboard when working at the computer.

We are also finding that there is great benefit in our teams sharing ideas and achievements with peers across our various locations. Regularly transporting multiple Team Members, many of whom have specialised transport needs, is not an option for us. The addition of some technology to allow Team Members to capture or transmit training between teams or to make videos to share amongst teams would be fantastic.

Additionally, we seek assistance to fund a small sound system and headphones. These will be used in our Sensory room for when Team Members are on work breaks to assist with providing either audio stimulation, or to block out noise to allow for rest or refocus.

Avenue Frenchs Forest supports over 160 people with significant disability from right across Sydney's North to work, socialise and learn. A challenge faced by the Avenue Frenchs Forest team when considering new work pursuits, is equipment. Our equipment resources are extremely stretched and overused, and new individual work endeavours by individuals often requires new technology or accessories.

The equipment purchased will benefit many residents who use this service now and in the future.

A variety of the public, with varying ages and health conditions, use the hall and the provision of an AED will provide support for medical emergencies requiring CPR if they eventuate.

Using an AED immediately after sudden cardiac arrest can increase the chance of survival by more than 90%; survival rates are reduced by approximately 10% for each minute that defibrillation is delayed.

The AED will also be a focal point for learning about first aid in the Group, and while it will not be used for demonstration purposes its use will be described and a similar demonstration device will be used to instruct youth members and adults on this lifesaving technology.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION: Increase Capacity - New Computers - The efficiency of MSTYP is being hampered by ageing equipment. The computers in the office are 9+ years old and cause a reduction in efficiency of between 20 – 30 minutes each

day (often more) per staff member, with slowness, rebooting, or issues with software.

We also currently do not have a dedicated box office computer during productions, nor are we effectively able to cater for work experience students, for which we could provide many meaningful placements. In the past we have borrowed staff member's laptops and computers for this task. However with the recent change of staffing this means we no longer have access to these devices.

We are proposing to purchase:

- 1 desktop computer for use in the office
- 1 laptop computer

This would increase the capacity of current staff to more efficiently serve the needs of the community from an administrative perspective. This means we can provide more for children, young people and artists as our time will no longer be spent resolving technical issues.

LAPTOP: The laptop will replace the Artistic Director's current desktop computer, and enable the organisation to better adapt to a more mobile work environment, where classes and rehearsals are held in a wide variety of locations around the North Shore. This will also be used during rehearsals and classes to help bring technological capabilities into the drama room with video editing, watching of other companies work, research and more.

DESKTOP: By having an additional computer this means that the MSTYP will also have the capacity to host more work experience students and volunteers in the office. It would also mean more efficiency with our current staff and their day-to-day activities. We would very much welcome the addition of more work experience positions available for the organisation,
