ORGANISATION NAME: StreetWork Australia

**ORGANISATION BACKGROUND:** StreetWork is a not-for-profit, community-based organisation that focuses

on prevention/early intervention strategies delivered to 'at risk' young people (YP) so that they have the same opportunities as their peers – that is to grow, to achieve their dreams and to develop as a person with high self-esteem. StreetWork's mission is to provide innovative and effective services for medium-high 'at risk' YP aged 11-18 affected by crime, mental health issues, violence, homelessness, social isolation, alcohol/substance misuse, those disengaged from school/education or with poor employment

with opportunities, to turn their lives around.

StreetWork has close to 40 years' experience working with 'at risk' YP, acting as a ""specialist concierge"" to connect YP to specific youth services providers such as Juvenile Justice, employment agencies, education and counselling services. Our aim is to assist 'at risk' YP to tackle the core problems they face, working to reinstate their self-esteem and self-worth by providing the best level of support possible. The organisation has three branches servicing Sydney's North Shore, Northern Beaches and Hornsby-Ku-ring-gai communities. StreetWork employs 9 full time, part time and

casual staff members and has more than 310 volunteers.

AMOUNT REQUESTED: \$5,000

PROJECT DESCRIPTION: StreetSizzle - Outreach BBQ – StreetSizzle is a Mobile Outreach Hub

(MOH), an early intervention strategy, whereby youth workers/trained volunteers go to where young people gather – to meet on their "turf". The strategy is built around recurring BBQ's (via a customised BBQ trailer) in places such as local skate parks or PCYC. The main objective is to provide a safe and inclusive environment for 'at risk' and/or homeless YP to receive support and connect with programs/services they may otherwise be unable to access. The program is regularly supported by other youth services organisations such as headspace and KYDS.

StreetWork's team of youth workers and volunteers gathers thirty minutes prior to start time to set up the BBQ, tables, flags/banners and prepare for food service. Once set up, the team begin offering YP a free sausage sizzle, engage them in conversation and invite them to participate in planned sports activities such as soccer, touch football, etc. StreetWork plays music and offers a fun and peaceful atmosphere for YP to engage with staff and peers.

StreetWork's programs focus on stabilising and/or improving a young person's risk to youth crime, mental illness/suicide, homelessness and early school leavers not engaged in employment. By taking a holistic approach that addresses risk and protective factors, StreetWork is better positioned to alleviate disadvantage and promote general wellbeing among YP.

The key social benefits of StreetSizzle include:

- Provides YP with access to youth workers in order to get the support they need to address issues affecting them.
- Improves youth engagement with services/programs in the local area that can support them, including StreetWork's KickStart Mentoring Program.
- Provides an opportunity for socially isolated YP already engaged with StreetWork, to interact in a structured, safe program and have fun with other YP."

1,000 kids (plus their parents and families) struggle with special needs and isolation. For most, social media is simply not an option as these kids are particularly at risk from bullying and predators. Is there a safe place for teens with challenges to go to connect with other kids who may be

struggling? The answer is no.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION: M2M North Shore –

M2M North Shore is a referral-based, parent-led, online forum to help connect and support teenagers aged 12-17 years with mild to moderate special needs or disabilities, their parents/carers, and the community of practitioners and providers.

There are 3 linked but separate forums:

- M2M Kids
- M2M Parents/Carers
- M2M Practitioners and Providers.

M2M provides a kids' forum that allows kids to chat in a safe and secure environment. The parents/carers' forum encourages parents and carers to share their personal experiences and local knowledge, extend the circle of support and encourage parent-led and funded social engagement and activities. The practitioner/providers' forum allows local support to be better targeted.

I am applying for the \$5,000 grant to cover the costs of:

- conducting a community launch of the program to participating schools
- promotional material
- some minor upgrades to the existing FB forum and website.

Of the approximately 10,000 students attending high schools in the Ku-ring-gai area, around 1,000 have disabilities or other challenges. These challenges may result in their being isolated from the mainstream and being particularly vulnerable to bullying and predators, especially on social media. Many parents also struggle with the challenges and isolation, as well as coping with their children's difficult journey. The forum is designed to provide a safe community to help parents and carers support their kids and each other by sharing information and encouraging safe connections.

**COMMENTS:** M2M is an online forum to help connect and support teenagers aged 12-17 years who have a disability, and their parents or carers.

The training we have highlighted as key is Management of Actual or Potential Aggression (MAPA).

Our stimulating, natural hands-on learning environment brings out the curiosity of children, extends their thinking and equips them ideally for a successful transition to school. One of the best things about KU Fox Valley is the sense of community that is fostered here. With frequent opportunities for families to contribute to the program they gain a sense of belonging through participation and we enjoy local connections with Greenwood aged care and Wahroonga Waterways Landcare. We aim to provide a high quality preschool experience and in doing so make lasting community connections. promoting connectivity and social capital, benefiting children and their families. Our objectives include developing genuine, reciprocal relationships within our community, drawing on the skills, experiences and inspirations of our parent community and staff. Meaningful, hands-on, relationship based naturalistic learning for children is a key objective in achieving this.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION: Connecting younger and older generations – Our project, Connecting

younger and older generations, builds on a visiting program that the children and staff at KU Fox Valley Preschool have built over the years in partnership with the residents and staff of Greenwood Aged Care. With this project we plan to make 5 visits to bring the children, staff and parent volunteers across to visit with the residents of Greenwood Aged care. In 2018-19 we implemented an adapted visiting program that focussed on relationships and reciprocal relationships rather than certain activities and resourcing. We have evaluated this project and found it to be more meaningful and beneficial for the residence and the children involved as it allows for unhurried interactions. By venturing across to Greenwood we are able to connect with residents who are otherwise isolated or unable to venture out themselves, and whilst the residents continue to visit us it is in smaller numbers and with those who are more able bodied. By engaging in this project we also plan to chronicle our visits and record them in selfpublished book format, the cost of which will be met in the preschool

budget.

accessible and expert mental health support service to young people across northern Sydney. KYDS mission is to support all young people to work through their mental health challenges and reach their full potential.

Last year KYDS delivered more than 2500 individual, free counselling sessions to around 250 young people aged 12-18 years. With a holistic approach, KYDS works with our clients and their families/parents/caregivers

to manage their mental health concerns - building and repairing relationships, learning skills and developing habits for the long term.

KYDS helps young people understand, and manage, difficult issues in their lives. We do this by providing easily accessed, personalised counselling and mental health support services, family counselling, and early intervention well-being workshops and information events. We ensure issues such as grief, loss, family break ups, friendship problems, school and study stress, addictions, risky behaviour, anger, bullying, anxiety, depression, alcohol and drug use, body image concerns, mental health

concerns, self-harm and suicidal thoughts do not overwhelm young people.

**disability** – This is a pilot project which will give children with disability and their families from Ku-ring-gai an opportunity to be involved in school holiday activities. A Lego® Friendship Skills Group session will be run in the Ku-ring-gai area (probably at Gordon Library Meeting Room) over 3 holiday periods. Families (brothers, sisters and parents of children with a disability) join in the group. Prior to attending families will receive resources and support to ensure the experience is as positive as possible. Families will

- have the same opportunities as other children to take part in holiday activities
- learn strategies together that support social play
- learn how to help their child manage at short, one off activities with children they may not know
- have a family activity to do in the school holidays
- connect up with other local families and make new friends (parents and children)
- feel safe and comfortable that their child will be meaningfully and successfully included

EarlyEd has been delivering our Friendship Group programs regularly for many years, particularly in the school holidays, using the Lego®-Base Therapy Program) at North Sydney and Pendle Hill. This is too far for families to travel with their family for a short program.

EarlyEd is committed to finding ways to support families in their local areas by giving them opportunities to learn and be supported and experiences they might not necessarily consider. EarlyEd is no longer funded to do support inclusion through community programs. This project will give families an opportunity to try an EarlyEd service without a financial commitment. This will mean that they can be comfortable with whatever outcome they can experience, experience something they may not have considered before, take their time to be part of the activity.

- 3. Foster a creative learning environment where teaching, play, and communication firm the basis for learning; and

A long established part of the community in operation since 1962, currently teaching 45 local children each day.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

PTP Community Connection Program – To conduct a series of 12 connection mornings where the staff, parent volunteers and groups of children of PTP visit the elderly and, in some instances, disabled, residents of the Princess Juliana Lodge ("Princess Juliana") in North Turramurra and engage in reading, card games, small puzzles, bubble blowing, as well as art, craft and music activities with the residents. Each visit will last approximately 2 hours. The program will be conducted once a week for 6 weeks in Term 3, 2019 and once a week for 6 weeks in Term 4, 2019. Grant funds are sought to pay for 12 return bus trips on a chartered bus on these 12 occasions between PTP and Princess Juliana to transport PTP staff, parent volunteers and students, and for some consumable resources for the visits. PTP has already conducted one set of 5 visits in Term 1, 2019 but now seeks grant funds to continue the program.

This project will contribute to provision of service by PTP by enabling it to assist the children to (i) learn to interact in relation to others with care, empathy and respect (ii) develop a sense of belonging to a community and an understanding of active community participation, (iii) respond to diversity with respect. These are all learning outcomes of the Early Years Learning Framework for Australia which PTP implements. The project will also assist PTP to carry out its mission to create a strong community spirit and connection. The aim of the project is to lessen the social isolation of the residents of Princess Juliana, increase awareness of older people and people with disabilities, to help the children of PTP feel valued and to give them the skills and opportunity to actively participate in the community. Repeating the visits in Term 3 and 4 2019 means that all children in the 3 day group will attend Princess Juliana a further 2 times this year and more residents of Princess Juliana will have an opportunity to engage with the children which will hopefully deliver benefits which may not be seen from the one-off set of visits already conducted earlier in 2019.

**ORGANISATION BACKGROUND:** 

Phoenix House Youth Services (www.phoenixhouse.org.au) has an established 30 years track record of youth support services for youth 'at risk' (aged 14 to 24) in the Northern Sydney Region. We provide solutions for young people who are disengaged from education, victims of family breakdown, mental health issues, a history of abuse, drug and alcohol addictions, bullying, experiences with the juvenile justice system and newly arrived CALD youth. Through our alternative education and training programs, young people are given the opportunity to break free from disadvantage and homelessness and forge a better future for themselves. Our wrap-around support services include free counselling, case management, employment opportunities, wellness workshops, family support seminars and recreational activities.

We collaborate with other services providers such as TAFE, the Department of Education, Family Referral Services, homelessness services, Council youth services, community based agencies, schools, hospitals such as the Royal North Shore Hospital.

Over 300 young people benefit from our services; approximately 60 in core training and educational programs, over 120 in life skills courses, 190 in case management. Each young person is assigned to a Youth Development Specialist who acts as a mentor and guide in supporting them achieve their life goals.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

RAP-The Resourceful Adolescent Program – The Resourceful Adolescent Program 'RAP' involves conducting a program that adds value to the lives of adolescents by equipping them with effective resilience skills so they can boost their mental health. It can be used as an early intervention tool to combat feelings of depression, mild anxiety, stress, isolation or inadequacy. It ultimately builds self-esteem, resilience and resourcefulness with the goal of helping adolescents maintain a sense of self when faced with stressful and difficult circumstances. It addresses psychological risk factors at an individual, family and academic level.

The program will be facilitated by highly qualified youth developments specialists and delivered through a series of consecutive sessions using a workshop and talking circles format. The time length is 60 minutes per weekly session and it will be run in two blocks over two school terms.

The RAP program will be run in 2 local schools, such as, Turramurra High School and St Ives High School, The RAP program will be run over 2 terms and will help address some of these issues; it will help the participants acquire self-regulation skills to manage academic pressures, anxiety, and other challenges they may face.

By participating in the program, students who need the support can access case management and counselling service, plus ongoing Well-being activities organised by Phoenix House. This holistic approach will boost social inclusion and is an early intervention strategy for mental health and help young people feel valued and connected to their community.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION: Dementia Project - The FACTS about Dementia

We are:

Increasing the public awareness of dementia

- Encouraging the development of dementia-friendly communities
- De-stigmatising dementia more broadly.

We do this by hosting a series of uncomplicated dementia education sessions and workshops for the general public, community leaders and organisations across Ku-ring-gai. These free public events explain what dementia really is, how it affects individuals and family caregivers, and informs participants about recognised treatments for dementia, thereby increasing community awareness. Since 2017, we have hosted 87 sessions to 2,110 Ku-ring-gai residents:

- 2017 = 874 participants / 38 sessions
- 2018 = 933 participants / 39 sessions
- 2019 (to date) = 303 participants / 10 sessions

With a combination of this Community Grant, our club's funding activities and public donations we will expose an additional 1,200+ residents to these events during 2019/20. We also hosted Ku-ring-gai's first Community Forum (27 August 2018), which discussed the steps to create dementia-friendly communities.

The FACTS about Dementia offers community members and organisations free information sessions designed to increase general awareness and understanding of dementia across the community.

The sessions are provided by teritary-qualified dementia care specialists and supported by Rotary. The sessions positively impact social inclusion and quality of life outcomes for people living with dementia. They also assist individuals living with dementia and family caregivers to remain active within their local community.

The information sessions explain:

- · what dementia is and is not
- the early signs of dementia
- · the differences between dementia and Alzheimer's
- how to care for someone living with dementia
- how to reduce the risk of developing dementia

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• what communities can do to support those living with dementia.

In Ku-ring-gai, there are 3,100 people living with dementia, which is roughly 2.5% of the population and twice the national average.

The information sessions started in March 2017 and since this time, 87 sessions have been held in Ku-ring-gai with 2,110 residents attending.

ORGANISATION NAME: Warrawee Public School P&C

**ORGANISATION BACKGROUND:** 

Warrawee Public School's P&C Association is made up of caring parents and citizens. The P&C promotes the interests of the parent body and the school by having parents, citizens, pupils and teaching staff work in close co-operation. Government funding for education is limited and it only covers a school's core operational expenses. Most times schools have needs that cannot be covered by government funding, and the P&C body every year engages in various fundraising activities to supply important educational resources, and maintain classrooms and school grounds in good and safe conditions. In past years our P&C body has been able to raise funds to provide new playground equipment and upgrades, smart boards, wi-fi, iPads, classroom air-conditioning, upgraded literacy and numeracy resources and flexible learning space furniture, among many other resources.

Besides fundraising the P&C body is concerned with students' and their families having a positive rich and rewarding experience during the school years. As explained below, the P&C body organises different committees who work on issues ranging from school social events, to traffic management.

AMOUNT REQUESTED: \$4,705

PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

Warrawee Public School Outdoor Learning Space – Adjacent to one of the school's playgrounds there is a large and potentially very attractive and educationally useful green space, currently unsuitable for children given the overgrown flora and lack of accessibility. The area could be re-established as a prime educational and teaching space if proper landscaping could be completed. Funds will be used to develop an area for outdoor learning. This will require removing weeds, leveling some ground, mulching and revitalising the area around a simple seating arrangement. This will create the momentum of outdoor experiential learning and create opportunities for student, teacher and community participation in maintaining this area of Blue Gum Forest.

The Warrawee P&C body aims to assist in providing innovative and sustainable educational experiences to the school's students. Much research has shown the importance of suitable learning spaces for children's educational outcomes, as well as the great benefits that outdoor play and learning may have for their development. By clearing this outdoor space and transforming it into a useful and attractive area, the school community in general and the students in particular, will benefit greatly by having access to an innovative but natural learning and teaching space.

This project will also create a stronger partnership between Warrawee P&C, and Warrawee Public School to bring this facility back to life. Most importantly students will receive an enhanced educational experience not only by using it for special lessons, but by assisting in caring for it and maintaining it. This will increase their knowledge about the environment and their commitment to it, and allow for genuine experiential learning, as they will learn about their environment, science and geography, and the art and culture that can stem from it. This learning space will provide a "hands on" environment for children to learn by doing and by being embedded in a natural setting.

Under Ku-ring-gai Community Grants Program Guidelines, capital assistance or maintenance of building or grounds cannot be funded,

including cost of labour.

This project is not considered a priority under Community Development and is more closely aligned with Council's Environmental Levy Small Grants Program. Discussions have been held with Council's Environment and Sustainability Department and the P&C will be informed of the application process. The Environmental Levy Grant applications are now open with a closing date 6 September 2019. The Environment and Sustainability can be
