6. Phoenix House Youth Services

ORGANISATION BACKGROUND:

Phoenix House Youth Services has a successful 35+ years track-record of working with "at risk" young people (aged 15-24), in the Northern Sydney region. We provided alternative education and training pathways, with wraparound support of case management and counselling, to the most challenged young people, delivering life-changing outcomes.

Our programs provide solutions for vulnerable young people who are disengaged or at risk of disengaging from education and/or employment. Many of these young people are affected by a number of factors including: family breakdown, drug and or alcohol abuse, mental health issues, domestic violence and homelessness. They will need strong wrap-around support services, which include counselling, case management, employment opportunities, resilience and wellness workshops, family support seminars and recreational activities; this is our core differentiator from other educational and employment services.

Phoenix House sees over 300 young people every year; with approximately 60 in core training and educational programs, over 120 in life skills courses and 190 in case management. We collaborate and partner with other local services, such as, Registered Training Organisations, Schools, Family Referral Services, homelessness services, Council youth services, and various other agencies.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

Connecting "at-risk" young people with work and community – The project uses a holistic approach to help youth 'at risk' in the Ku-ring-gai LGA, faced with complex needs and multiply barriers to get Work Ready. This is done through community connections, wellbeing programs (such as resilience and life skills programs) in conjunction with work skills workshops and social enterprise activities to equip young people with transferable enterprise skills that they can apply for the career avenues and pathways they are choosing.

A key differentiator of the project is the Phoenix House wrap-around support in case management and counselling that helps to address youth anxiety, mental health issues and boost their confidence and self-esteem so they are able to focus on getting those skills.

Unfortunately, youth mental health has significantly dropped from the start of the social isolation and it has disengaged the young from employment and community even further.

The aim of the program is to re-engage youth within the community by establishing connections, helping them develop practical skills and creating opportunities for their transition into further training and/or employment.

Through the use of art, craft and music, the program develops listening, spoken language and social skills in the early stages of a child's life. These skills enable participating children to overcome the challenges of hearing loss and thrive in their communities. 'Kidscape' also builds a supportive community for parents, fostering lifelong friendships as their children participate in this weekly play-based activity group. Siblings are also encouraged to participate and benefit from interacting with other children who have hearing loss.
