Using an array of easily obtainable tools, to print with paint, and create exciting images, designs, and textures. As well as rollers and combs, natural and botanical specimens, found objects, recyclables and packaging can give surprising results. We will use botanical specimens that are native to the Ku-ring-gai area. Progressing with confidence, to the addition of stencils, overdrawing, mixed media art, and a practical use for prints that the students will deliver. Designs will reflect the bush and water of our beautiful Ku-ring-gai Shire and surrounds. Gelli plates, tools, and an additional personal kit of printmaking accessories, will be provided by the tutor. ### 6. StreetWork Australia Limited

ORGANISATION BACKGROUND: StreetWork delivers prevention and early intervention strategies to at-risk young people (YP) in the Ku-ring-gai community. StreetWork's mission is to ensure at-risk YP have the same opportunities as their peers, which is to grow, to achieve their dreams, and to develop as a person with a high self-esteem through the delivery of innovative and effective early intervention programs. The organisation supports YP aged 11-18 and seeks to stabilise and/or improve a young person's risk across five key areas:

- 1. Mental health;
- 2. Suicide and self-harm;
- 3. Youth crime;
- 4. Early school leavers not engaged in employment; and
- 5. Youth homelessness.

StreetWork has 40 years experience working with at-risk YP and acts as a "community connector", linking YP to specific youth services providers such as Juvenile Justice, employment agencies, education and counselling services .StreetWork's service delivery aims to improve access to education, training and/or employment as well as assistance in addressing mental health concerns, alcohol or substance misuse and youth crime, which is essential to alleviate long-term disadvantage and promote general wellbeing. StreetWork employs 9 full time, part time and casual staff members and has more than 340 volunteers.

**Changing Strokes -** Changing Strokes is a new program which utilises creative art as a way of improving a young person's ability to re-engage in school/education whilst also seeking to stabilise and/or improve a young person's risk to youth crime and mental health concerns. Ultimately StreetWork is seeking to alleviate disadvantage and promote general wellbeing among young people living in Ku-ring-gai. StreetWork improves educational engagement by addressing both risk and protective factors including destructive family relationships, youth crime, mental health issues, homelessness, social isolation, alcohol/substances misuse, or poor employment opportunities.

Changing Strokes is a new youth engagement program, which intends to address anti-social behaviour and community safety among male participants, and mental health and wellbeing among female participants. The eight-week program connects each young person with an art tutor and positive adult role model. It will see them engaged in a trusted oneon-one relationship building environment with a focus on mentoring, tailored art program and counselling.
