The proposed names reflect the locality of the area – considering the surrounding flora, fauna, heritage and neighbourhood.



Twin Creeks Reserve - northern and southern creek lines nominated for naming

Please tick ONE name in each of the below for the northern and southern creeks.

Northern creek (tick one):

Peppermint Creek - Peppermint Gums grow along the creek line (currently nominated).

Piperita Creek – The scientific name for the Peppermint Gum is *Eucalyptus piperita*.

Rowland Creek - Rowland St is the main street adjacent to the creek.

Mitchell Creek - The creek begins at Mitchell Crescent.

Southern creek (tick one):

Water Dragon Creek – Reflecting the established community of Water Dragons (currently nominated).

Bidgiwung – It is believed this term derives from a local Indigenous dialect and means "water lizard" (subject to Metropolitan Aboriginal Lands Council approval).

Rothwell Creek - Rothwell Rd is the main road adjacent to the creek.

Osborne Creek - Laura Houison Osborne Sanctuary (formerly Lorikeet Sanctuary) is located upstream of the creek. It was founded in 1966, and is home to a variety of fauna.

Stencil Creek – There is an Aboriginal heritage site situated nearby that has rock art (hand stencils).

Duff Creek – The creek flows through Duff Reserve upstream.

Granny Springs Creek - The creek flows through Granny Springs Reserve upstream.
